First, I want to let everyone know that our Isaac clean-up and repairs expenses are now over \$27,000 with probably another \$6,000 to \$10,000 remaining in replacements/repairs. The largest of which will be the repair of the erosion under the south side of the pool deck. The financial impact of this “little storm” underscores the importance of maintaining a healthy capital fund balance with plenty to spare. While we paid out more than \$24,000 in Isaac related expenses in September, we still only lost a little over \$3,000 last month. Even though our bar revenue was the lowest it has been all year, it was still very healthy given the fact that we were closed for a week during the Isaac event. Overall, we are still looking at a very healthy financial picture and still have some significant events to come. Nine months (75%) into this year we are at 79% of our projected revenue, however due to a number of unplanned expenses we are at only 50% (or \$35,000) of our projected profit. No matter how you measure it, this is still a very good year. So, many thanks to those of you that have participated by volunteering for our events as well as those of you that supported our events by your attendance and participation. It is always great to see everyone enjoying themselves.

While we have made some significant improvements in the PYC Family Room, there is still more to come. Stop by and check it out. I am also happy to report that we are half way to our \$400 goal (through volunteer donations) to obtain a classic style popcorn machine for the club to be enjoyed by all.

Please keep an eye on the calendar for those special events and, of course, those wonderful Friday Night Dinner events. If any new or old members would like to volunteer for a Friday Dinner but are a bit hesitant about the logistics of cooking for that many people (we usually plan for about 30), please give me a call and I will be happy to lend a hand or advice.

Remember, we continue to gain new members, so keep an eye out for them and make them feel at home and don't be afraid to invite your friends to experience the club as your guests. Who knows, they may experience something they like and want to join.

As always, if you have ideas on how we can improve things for our members, please let us know.

A CAT NEWS!– BOB HODGES

Quick recap - 114 competitors and five races sailed in 19-26 knots over two of five days scheduled for racing. Days 4, 5, and reserve day cancelled due to Hurricane Sandy. Initially this was going to be a split fleet format with qualifying races towards a gold/silver split. The decision was made on Sunday afternoon to race as one fleet since the PRO and RC felt that at least 15-20 competitors would sit out the racing forecast for Monday. That was pretty accurate. We had 80 boats on the line for Race 1 and around 60 for Races 2 and 3 on Monday. Around 45-50 boats started the last two races (not that many finished). Races 1 and 2 were raced in 20-22 knots, Race 3 was 22-24 knots with some gusts at 25-26 knots (Molasses Reef tower 8 miles upwind of the course was recording gusts over 30 knots). Our class rules call for abandonment when the breeze increases over 22 knots for more than 15 minutes and we did not meet that criteria on Monday. On Tuesday, racing was cancelled with steady 24-26 knots of wind on the race course. Two races done on Wednesday, race 1 in 19-22 knots similar to Monday and Race 2 in 22-25 knots and shortened as the breeze built. The real issue was not the breeze strength but the sea state. We had persistent current against wind direction during the racing all week and we were in the ocean so the wave heights and periods were impressive (the videos of the racing compress what it was actually like). I've never gotten so airborne (and still stayed on the boat) while sailing upwind. Downwind, it was obviously a game of finding the runway to keep the bows out of the backs of the waves. The Aussies and the top Euros were much more comfortable with handling these conditions as North American sailors do not race in high winds and big seas often. I finished 38th in Race 1, improved to 28 in race 2, and was having a great race in 19th in race 3 but 2/3rds of the way down the last downwind, my luck ran out and I flipped during a jibe. It was pretty violent and my mast snapped in the upper third when it hit the water and the boat immediately went upside down. During the recovery process the crash boat crew lost the retrieval line I had tied to the underwater rig and \$8K of carbon mast, boom, and a new Glaser sail sank to the bottom of the Hawk Channel. Towed in upside down but boat OK. They are going to try to recover the rig for me next week when the weather calms down but I was out of the event (Boat US is covering the loss, very nice about it). I was offered another rig for Wednesday's racing but I declined since I could not be financially responsible if I had a similar experience. Instead, I piloted one of three jet skis they used for rescue on the course. That was a pretty fun substitute.

Mischa Heemskerk from the Netherlands won the event and was the first European to win in some time as Aussies have won the last 9 times. He deserved it as he really trained hard and spent a lot of time training this past year in big wind and seas in the North Sea where he lives. He is a great ambassador for our class as he always had a big smile on his face and loves to sail in big wind. We should have had two Americans in the top ten, Lars Guck and Matt Struble. Lars flipped in Race 1 and got separated from his boat and had to be rescued and brought back to it (boat OK). Matt Struble broke a rudder in Race 3. If you replaced Lars DNF with the average of his other scores, he would have finished 5th and Matt would have finished 8th. Another big loser was 49er Gold Medalist and Artemis AC helmsman Nathan Outerridge who broke a daggerboard in Race 3 after launching off a wave upwind. He would have finished 1st or 2nd if that had not happened. There were no throwouts with the five races completed, needed one more.

I think the quote of the week for me was after I asked Outerridge what was harder, the conditions at this event or racing an AC 45 on San Francisco Bay. He smiled and said the racing in the wind and short/steep waves in Islamorada were tougher, 45' of length buys you more breathing room!
